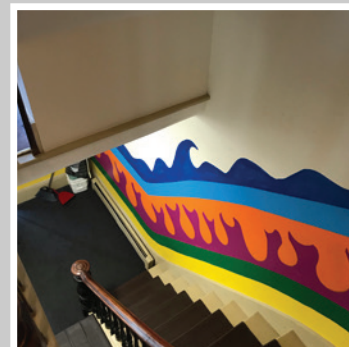

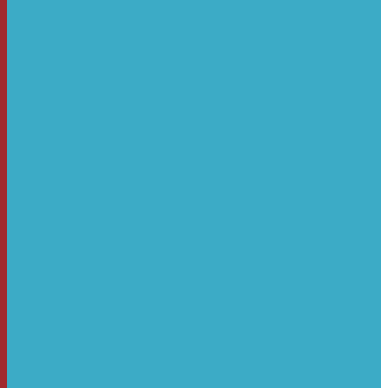

# A Message From Our Leaders



"Take Society at its roots- the Family", said Fr. Stephen Pernet, "and transform it in the spirit of Christ". The founder of the Little Sisters of the Assumption and the namesake of Pernet Family Health Service communicated this message in 1865 and it still is so relevant today. Since the beginning of time, family has shaped civilization. Pernet Family Health Service's mission supports the long term strengthening of family life.

For these reasons, Pernet Family Health Service is committed more than ever to strengthen families. Whether it is immediate needs such as food, infant formula, diapers; or teaching, support and supervision around appropriate parenting; to supporting Youth in exploring the stages of growing up; Pernet supplies the resources needed. To that end, we have been very fortunate in accessing the government and private financial resources from the CARES Act, the Governor's Relief Fund, the Worcester Together Fund, DPH Health Equity grant and much more, including 100% support from our own Board of Directors to keep our services going.

So it is with gratitude to all of Pernet Family Health Service's supporters and donors, that we thank you for helping us continue this important mission of strengthening families. It is the greatest hope for the future.

# Emergency Assistance Program

Thank you for helping us keep our doors open for families in need.

The pandemic disrupted life as we knew it. Some companies laid off workers and all schools and day cares were closed. Pernet made the decision for staff to work from home but one department had to stay open, physically, in the agency- The Emergency Assistance Program. This program is a vital lifeline to the community as it provides emergency food and infant supplies to those in need.

It happened almost immediately. As soon the state went into lock down, we implemented the social distancing, cleaning and other best practice precautionary safety procedures. The number of people seeking assistance increased week by week. Families were looking for food. Parents were looking for infant formula, baby cereal and diapers. We knew we had to keep our doors open not only for the 01610 Zip Code but for anyone who needed help.

Our staff, Yildiz and Melissa, and volunteer, Tony, kept the program running. They showed up every day and made sure everyone who came got the assistance they needed. We got a very heartwarming response from donors who sent in

money or donated food. One of our volunteers and donor organized a food drive, our monthly donors increased their donations, board members sent in donations and foundations simplified grant applications and/or gave unrestricted grants. We are thankful to all who answered the call and helped us keep our doors open for those in need.

When Jane came to the food pantry in May for food, she told staff that things had been much more difficult for their family since the beginning of the pandemic. Not having family nearby and with three children ages 7, 5, and 1 she lost her job as a store clerk as she had no childcare. Jane was given food, diapers, and formula. She was very grateful to be able to have the extra support from Pernet for her family during this difficult time. She was not sure how she would afford the expense for baby formula and diapers otherwise. Pernet was also able to give her a summer fun kit for her older children with toys and fun activities and sunscreen. Jane said the sunscreen especially came in handy for her children spending time outside. She was also able to get further information for her child's Pandemic EBT card information which was able to help her with extra support.

## FRONTLINE HERO

Joan, our Maternal Child Health nurse, has had a busy schedule during this pandemic. Like a true frontline hero, she never cancelled any appointment. As a registered nurse, Joan has the expertise in infection control and has visited seriously ill or premature babies in their homes. She encountered several families that were directly and indirectly affected by the pandemic. A few families had

positive Covid-19 tests; a mom had two separate positive tests; two babies tested positive as well. Thankfully, all are doing well.

Some of the visits are done in shelters and there were multiple shelters with residents with positive tests that caused Pernet's nursing clients exposure, but with the help of Joan's guidance for health precautions our clients remained healthy.

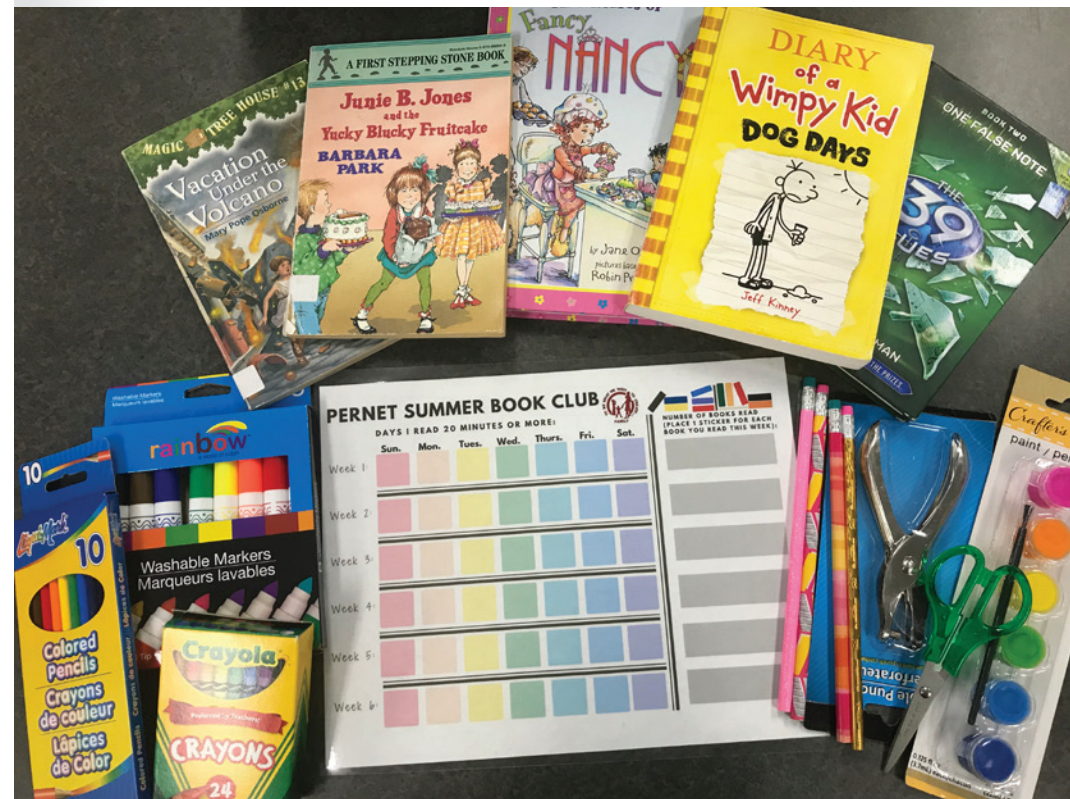

# Book Club:

The pandemic lockdown was very challenging for all of us but we felt it was important to keep the tradition of the summer book club. Tricia & Kaylyn ran the program once a week for seven weeks. The Program's goal is to provide neighborhood youth with a digital space where they can maintain and improve their reading skills. They dropped off books, reading trackers, and craft supplies to each of the youth at home based on their interests and reading levels. Youth were able to connect with their peers in the neighborhood in a time

when contact with other youth their age was difficult. They discussed books they read and even created comic strips about the books they read. It was challenging to run the program digitally, but we are happy that for the youth and the staff, the pandemic did not stop the Book Club.

# Virtual Summer Youth Program

Starting a new job is always a little daunting. Starting it in the middle of an international pandemic makes it more complicated. When Danny Diaz began his job as Youth Program Coordinator, he didn't know it would involve the re-design of programs, the building of community trust by video and conducting all business from home! We are happy to report that, in spite of the many challenges faced this year, the youth programs are moving forward successfully.

Back in February, Danny was so new to his role that he had only met a handful of the youth when Covid-19 hit, and all operations moved to remote communications. The Youth Summer Program, which had traditionally involved outdoor work in a community garden, had to be re-tooled to be conducted fully online. Danny reached out to the young participants and devised a curriculum that would provide meaningful connections and support, while still adhering to social distancing protocols. The youth group started their virtual programming ready to learn. Topics included:

- **Who am I? Identity**
- **Self Esteem/Decision Making**
- **Communication**
- **Violence**
- **Morals/Respect**
- **Culture/Diversity**

The youth started off identifying their goals. One said his goal was to buy a car while another wanted to own a home. Danny helped the young person break down the steps of a goal into achievable steps and objectives. The group talked about having friends who can distract you from your goal. They even talked about credit score and how to build it. By the end, the teens understood what they needed to build a good credit score and they now had short-term goals and long-term goals. They had learned how to be good citizens, and to engage in proper communication including mock job interviews and respect for different cultures in our society.

Danny started the meetings with motivational videos on different topics and he would lead discussions with the group about how the video applies to them. They would have a few minutes to catch up then watch a video from the show 'What would you do?'. This would generate a lot of discussions that sometimes led to something they had watched on the news.

Were there challenges along the way? Of course! Danny was working from home and his 3-year-old twins would pop in and out of the meetings (they're cute and very well behaved but toddlers will be toddlers). Sometimes family would forget that the youth is online and would come to ask the youth a question or the occasional visitor who shows up announced who must be turned away. Throughout the summer, the youth have kept in touch, Danny has built a rapport with them, and important lessons were learned.

## Parent Aide Program

Massachusetts College of Pharmacy student interns worked on a survey to evaluate the Parent Aide Program. They interviewed 39 clients.

94% said they were either very satisfied or extremely satisfied with the services they received from Pernet.

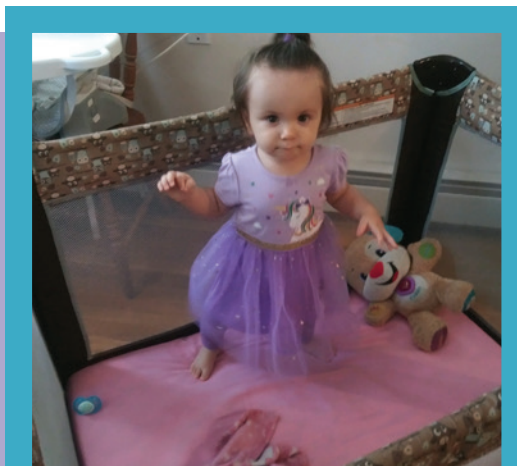

# Pernet Early Intervention

## The staff taught me to follow my grandchild's lead

When I met with the staff from Pernet's Early Intervention, I was amazed at how friendly they were. They listened to us, understood our fears without dismissing us and they have helped us gain confidence in what our child is able to do. When you have a child born with water in the brain, you are afraid of normal day to day activities because you do not want even the slightest injury. Having the right staff is important. The staff taught me to follow my grandchild's lead. They have given me a lot of tips on how to work with my granddaughter. They pay

attention to her and they teach me how to help her. She is 1.5 years and, until recently, would not even use a sippy cup. We tried making an adjustment to the sippy cup, but she kept refusing to tip it over. Then one day I gave her a cup with no cover, and she drank right out of it. The staff have taught me to be patient and to let go of my fears. Moments that I treasure are seeing the staff at the end of a visit wave and blow kisses to my granddaughter. I feel good knowing that the staff is sincere and wants the best for my grandchild.

# Nurturing Fathers Group

## Where there is a will, there is a way

John is the father of three teenaged girls and joined the Nurturing Fathers group for information and support around parenting. One of his daughters has a disability, and, due to her often-unpredictable moods and behaviors, John found it particularly difficult to guide her as a parent. When John began attending the group, he was finding it hard to engage with her due to her negative moods and tantrums. After joining the group, however, John began to view his own role as a father in a different way. With the strategies he learned in the group, he found activities to do with Hannah that would help her regulate and allow them to spend positive time together. The pandemic gave them a lot of time to spend together and John's dedication to finding common ground with his daughter proved the old adage that "where there is a will, there is a way." The father/daughter team found many projects to share. They dismantled a couch for disposal, built planters and planted many flowers and vegetables and worked together to build a new trampoline. John and Hannah are enjoying looking for different projects to work on

together. While John still struggles with managing his daughter's behaviors, he has continued to enjoy the support and guidance he receives from attending the nurturing father's group.

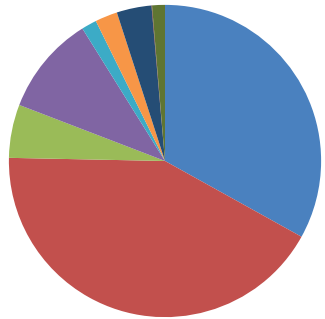

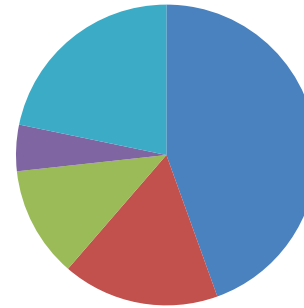

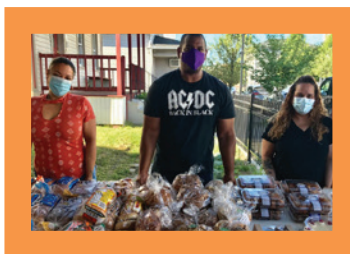
